Who was an important non-family mentor in your life and how did this person impact your career?

Dr. Louis Wright, professor at Howard University. He taught me the importance of critical thinking and listening with a third ear. When students would comment on thinking outside the box, he would reply, "Why do you need a box to think?" Those lessons have been invaluable in my practice of law and helping me identify complex legal issues and evaluate complex civil cases.

What do you consider your biggest personal accomplishment and why?

I live my biggest accomplishment every day at Hart Law. I opened my law firm immediately after graduating from law school. Eighteen years ago I took a leap of faith, and it was the best decision ever.
